

Lot-holders followed regulations at St. Michael's

This receipt found in a box of old forgotten papers was signed by Rev. Philip McEnroe and dated 1911, proved that John Levan paid for burial in a lot in St. Michael's Cemetery. At the bottom of his receipt, a list of six regulations mentioned that the Cemetery and Holy Infancy Catholic Church remained under the authority of the Diocese of Philadelphia until Jan. 28, 1961, when Pope John XXIII established the Diocese of Allentown, comprised of Lehigh, Berks, Carbon, Northampton and Schuylkill counties.

REGULATIONS


- 1. For each interment a Certificate will be required from one of the Catholic Clergymen of the Diocese of Philadelphia, attesting that the deceased is entitled to burial according to the discipline of the Catholic Church.
- 2. No Lot-holder will be allowed to receive any consideration for the right of sepulture, which he may think proper to grant, for the interment in his lot of any of his deceased friends.
- **3.** No Lot-holder will be allowed to transfer the privilege of burial, conceded by this Receipt, to any person whomsoever, without the consent in writing of the Rev'd Pastor of the church.
- **4.** No grave will be opened in any lot unless the Deed of same is produced.
- **5.** All the improvements of lots by the erection of Monuments, Railings, etc., must be submitted to the proper authority before being carried into effect.
- **6.** The Rev'd Pastor of the church reserves to himself and to his successors in office, the right of making any additional regulations that may be required from time to time for the good of the Cemetery.

Happy Days at Gus's Dwarfed between two houses and sporting its signature striped awning, Gus's provided good meals and great coffee, especially for Lehigh students and faculty. Originally located on the corner of New St. and W. Packer Ave., Gus's started as a grocery store and snack shop. Having survived redevelopment in 1958, Gus's moved to 474 Verona St. (shown below), where it remained until Lehigh's expansion project in 1966, when it and the surrounding homes became ghosts of the Vanished Neighborhood.
